## Reminders from Security

Another reminder, the deadline for lot cleanup is May 15, 2026. Afterwards, any lots still in disrepair will begin to receive violations. **Rule 6:** " All members must maintain their assigned lots and RVs in a presentable and clean manner and adhere to the following guidelines:..." Within the next week or two, reminder emails are going to be sent out regarding the lot number stickers on members' trailers. All lots are required to have the 3-inch reflective stickers at the top left corner of their lots. (**Rule 6(c):** "Lot numbers must be displayed in the upper left-hand corner (facing the lot from the road) of the RV using **3-inch reflective numbers.**") Any lots that need new stickers or have the incorrect lot number will receive an email to inform them that a correction is needed. Finally, we are getting closer to the deadline for golf cart registration stickers. Golf cart registration stickers should be on all golf carts by **Memorial Day, May 25, 2026**. They are available in the office for **\$50.00 a sticker**. Golf carts must be brought down to the office for an inspection in order to receive your registration sticker.

Just a quick recap -

A Section - There were three members who announced they were running as write-in candidates before the ballots were mailed. Out of 293 memberships, there were 113 ballots returned for a 38.6% return-Bill Cornelius received 32 votes, Debbie D had 35 votes and Mike Mary received 40. Also, Robert Jones, Keith Critchlow, Martin Pavlik, Kim Jarvis and Mike Blue each receiving 1 vote and there was 1 void.

C Section - Two candidates were on the ballot. Out of 196 membership, 105 ballots were returned for a 53.6% return. Tom Keating received 54 votes and Tara Lang received 49 votes. There were two members written in with 1 vote each- Kenneth Leasha and R Malick.

Committee meeting: The next committee meeting is May 2 at 10:30 to prepare for the annual election to review the dates, guidelines and letters of intent/interest. With Labor Day being late this year (Sept 7th), our other dates will also be pushed out to meet our dates established by our Bylaws. We will discuss how we can improve our members' return rate to meet or exceed 51%. When Bylaws are included on our ballots, we must get a 51% return in order to accept (if they should pass) any Bylaws amendments on the ballot.

## Bylaws Committee



The next committee meeting is scheduled for May 16 at 9 AM in the Rec Hall. An email notice will be sent to the committee members after I prepare the agenda for this meeting.

Last year, there were four proposed Bylaw amendments on the ballot.

Refer to ART IX, Section 3. *All amendments to these Bylaws shall require the participation of fifty-one percent (51%) of the members, either in person or by proxy or by ballot, and the majority of the votes shall govern.* Since we did not receive 51% participation of our 1,149 memberships who returned their ballot, the proposed Bylaws could not be accepted even though they passed with the actual vote count. Therefore, our first order of business will be to review those four proposed amendments for changes or accept as was presented last year.

Note to the Committee members: Over the last few months, Chuck Spicuzza had asked to send to him any potential Bylaws amendments that we should be discussing. I also have one or two from our attorney where there are conflicts within our Bylaws. If you have a Bylaw you want to discuss, please email me at [a220#@gmail.com](mailto:a220#@gmail.com) so I can add the agenda.

Always, please bring your own copy of our Bylaws with you to the meeting.

In looking at the calendar, we will have about 2 months to review, propose, consult with our attorney, take to the July Board meeting and have the amendments ready for the printing of the ballots by end of July. The Board does not approve our recommendations but they may have suggested revisions. Refer to ART XI, Section 14. *ART XI, Section 14. The Bylaws Committee shall meet from time to time to review the Bylaws, evaluate any possible changes and make recommendations to the Board of Directors for suggested revisions of the Bylaws.....*

Lastly, since we are the Bylaws committee, we will talk about how we - the committee members - can improve or campaign to improve our members' participation in voting so we can meet or exceed 51%.

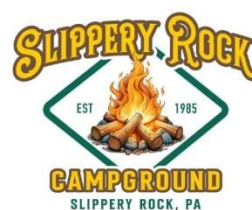
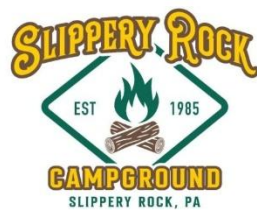

## **Autism Awareness Month: Supporting and Celebrating Children on the Spectrum**

April is recognized as Autism Awareness Month—a time dedicated to increasing understanding, acceptance, and support for individuals on the autism spectrum, especially children. Autism, or Autism Spectrum Disorder (ASD), is a developmental condition that affects how children communicate, interact, and experience the world. Because it is a spectrum, every child with autism is unique, with their own strengths, challenges, and ways of learning and growing.

For children on the spectrum, everyday experiences—such as school, social interactions, or changes in routine—can feel overwhelming. Some children may have difficulty with verbal communication, while others might be highly expressive but struggle with social cues. Many also experience sensory sensitivities, making certain sounds, lights, or environments challenging.

Autism Awareness Month is an opportunity to highlight the importance of early understanding and support. When families, educators, and communities work together, children with autism are better equipped to thrive. Simple, thoughtful actions—like using clear language, maintaining consistent routines, and creating sensory-friendly spaces—can make a significant difference in a child's comfort and confidence.

Equally important is celebrating what makes each child special. Many children on the spectrum have incredible creativity, strong attention to detail, and unique ways of thinking that bring new perspectives to the world around them. By recognizing and nurturing these strengths, we help build self-esteem and encourage growth.

This April, let's go beyond awareness and move toward acceptance. By teaching kindness, encouraging inclusion in communities, and listening to the experiences of children and their families, we can create a more supportive environment where every child feels seen, valued, and empowered to succeed.

## **Submissions from the Membership**

### **Keeping our kids safe....**

Campground Newsletter – 2nd installment

#### **Part 2: What clearances does Pennsylvania require for those working or volunteering with children?**

Great question! Pennsylvania requires three main background checks for anyone working or volunteering with children. All clearances are valid for 60 months (5 years):

##### **1. PA Child Abuse History Clearance (Act 151/33)**

- ✓ **What it is:** A search of the ChildLine database to see if the applicant has been named as a perpetrator in a child abuse report.

- ✓ **How to apply:** Submitted online.
- ✓ **Timeline:** Usually 2–4 weeks.
- ✓ **Cost:** \$13 (Free for volunteers once every 57 months).

## 2. PA State Police Criminal History (Act 34)

- ✓ **What it is:** A standard state-level criminal background check (PATCH).
- ✓ **How to apply:** Submitted online.
- ✓ **Timeline:** Often instantaneous, but can take up to 4 weeks.
- ✓ **Cost:** \$22 (Free for volunteers).

## 3. FBI Federal Criminal History (Fingerprinting - Acts 73 & 114)

This is a federal, fingerprint-based check processed through IdentoGO.

- ✓ **Act 73:** Mandatory for employees or volunteers with direct child contact under the Child Protective Services Law.

- ✓ **Act 114:** Specifically for school employees and contractors.

- ✓ **The 10-Year Exception:** Volunteers who have lived in Pennsylvania for the entire last 10 years may be exempt from the FBI check. Instead, they must sign a sworn affidavit (Disclosure Statement) confirming they have no disqualifying offenses.

- ✓ **Cost:** Approximately \$23.85 for employees / \$22.95 for volunteers.

### Important Note: Arrest & Conviction Reporting (Act 24)

Employees and volunteers must also be aware of the **Arrest/Conviction Report and Certification Form (PDE-6004)**.

- ✓ If an individual is arrested or convicted of a “reportable offense”, they must notify their employer or organization in writing within **72 hours**.
- ✓ The official list of offenses and the reporting form can be found on the PA Department of Education website.

---

Why this matters for SRCA:

While these requirements are detailed, they are vital tools for screening campground members, visitors, and staff. Understanding these options helps us simplify the selection process while ensuring we keep our children and our community safe.

A psychologist walked around a room while teaching stress management to an audience. As she raised a glass of water, everyone expected they'd be asked the "Half empty or Half full" question. Instead, with a smile on her face, she inquired: "How heavy is this glass of water?" Answers called out ranged from 8 oz. to 20 oz. She replied, "The absolute weight doesn't matter. It depends on how long I hold it. If I hold it for a minute, it's not a problem. If I hold it for an hour, I'll have an ache in my arm. If I hold it for a day, my arm will feel numb and paralyzed. In each case, the weight of the glass doesn't change, but the longer I hold it, the heavier it becomes." She continued, the stresses and worries in life are like that glass of water. Think about them for a while and nothing happens. Think about them a bit longer and they begin to hurt. And if you think about them all day long, you will feel paralyzed- incapable of doing anything.

**MORAL:** It's important to remember to let go of your stresses. As early in the evening as you can, put all your burdens down. Don't carry them through the evening and into the night. Remember to put the glass down!



# From Reactivity to Purpose: The Power of Value-Based Living

In the journey of personal growth, there is a transformative moment when we stop asking, "How do I survive this person's behavior?" and start asking, "Who do I want to be in this moment?" This shift marks the transition into **Value-Based Living**.

When we live by our values, we move from being "reactive"—where our mood depends on how others treat us—to being "principled," where our internal compass dictates our response regardless of the external weather.

---

## Understanding the "Emotional Toddler"

To live by your values, you must first learn to identify when you are dealing with an **Emotional Toddler**. This term doesn't refer to age, but to emotional maturity. Just as a two-year-old lacks the brain development to regulate big feelings, an emotional toddler in an adult body lacks the skills to manage disappointment, ego bruises, or boundaries.

### How to Identify One:

- **The Blame Game:** They rarely take accountability. If something goes wrong, it is always someone else's fault.
  - **All-or-Nothing Thinking:** They see people as "all good" or "all bad." There is no middle ground or nuance.
  - **Emotional Outbursts:** They use anger, pouting, or the silent treatment to manipulate an outcome or express discomfort.
  - **Lack of Empathy:** They are so consumed by their own immediate "need" or "hurt" that they cannot see how their actions affect you.

## The Strategy: How to Deal with Emotional Toddlers

Dealing with an emotional toddler requires a shift in perspective. You cannot use logic to argue with a feeling; you must use structure to manage the interaction.

### 1. Maintain Emotional Neutrality (The "Grey Rock")

Emotional toddlers feed on a reaction. If they can make you angry or defensive, they have successfully moved the focus away from their behavior and onto yours. By staying calm and "boring"—like a grey rock—you refuse to provide the emotional "fuel" they are looking for.

## 2. Set "If/Then" Boundaries

Don't try to change their character; instead, manage your environment. Use clear, non-negotiable logic:

*"If you continue to raise your voice, then I am going to hang up/leave the room. We can try this conversation again when things are calmer."*

## 3. Don't J.A.D.E. (Justify, Argue, Defend, Explain)

When you explain yourself to an emotional toddler, they see it as an invitation to negotiate. You do not need their permission or agreement to set a boundary. State your position once, clearly, and move on.

---

## Integrating Values into the Conflict

Value-based living is your greatest tool when facing these difficult personalities. When an emotional toddler tries to pull you into the mud, ask yourself: **"What value am I practicing right now?"**

- If your value is **Integrity**, you stay calm because you don't scream, not because they deserve your silence.
- If your value is **Accountability**, you hold your ground on a project because the work matters, even if they are throwing a tantrum about the process.
- If your value is **Self-Compassion**, you walk away because you recognize that your peace is more important than "winning" an argument with someone who isn't playing by the same rules.

By focusing on your values, the emotional toddler becomes a "relevance test" for your character rather than a threat to your well-being. You aren't just managing them; you are mastering yourself.
